
Immigrants Make New Hampshire Stronger



An estimated 97,000 immigrants live in New Hampshire, making up 7% of the total population.

Immigrants live in 11% of households in New Hampshire.

Immigrants contribute to every sector of New Hampshire's economy. Some 8% of New Hampshire's labor force are immigrants, including 6% of the construction industry, 12% of manufacturing, 10% of business services, and 8% of leisure and hospitality.

Annual spending power

About 9,000 immigrants in New Hampshire work in STEM-related jobs, of which 35% are temporary immigrants on H-1B and other temporary work visas. In all, 16% of STEM degree holders in New Hampshire are immigrants.

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost New Hampshire's communities. Some 50,000 immigrants, or about 51% of all immigrants in New Hampshire, are U.S. citizens. About 21,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 9,000 are temporary immigrants (including nonimmigrant visa holders and international students).

An estimated 34,000 of individuals in New Hampshire, are either undocumented immigrants or live with an undocumented immigrant. Some 5,000 U.S. citizen children in New Hampshire live with an undocumented parent, while some 2,000 U.S. citizen spouses are married to an undocumented immigrant. Some 8,000 undocumented individuals in New Hampshire have lived in the U.S. for more than 10 years, with 2,000 of those living in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

Self-employed

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 3,000 and **contribute \$80 million annually to New Hampshire's economy.** They also contribute \$6 million in state and local taxes each year.

An estimated 3,000 immigrants in New Hampshire are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim, and contribute \$103 million to New Hampshire's economy annually.

Immigrant groups currently protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—have access to work authorizations, making up an estimated 2,000 workers in New Hampshire's labor force, and paying an estimated \$10 million annually in state and local taxes.
