

No matter your immigration status, **you have rights** when interacting with law enforcement and immigration agents at work



You have the right to remain silent. You are not required to answer questions about your immigration status, including your country of birth or how you entered the United States. *Say, "I do not wish to answer any questions."*



Stay calm and do not run away. Running can be a reason for ICE to arrest you. Instead, you may ask if you are free to go. If yes, calmly walk away.



You have the right to refuse consent to a search of your person or vehicle. *You can say something like, "I do not consent to a search."*



Do not sign any documents. You have the right to speak to your lawyer before signing any documents or answering any questions.



If you have valid immigration documents, you should show them. Keep copies at home and saved in your phone. Never provide false documents.



You have the right to record your interaction with immigration agents when you are lawfully present in a public space (like streets, parks, and sidewalks), and if authorized by private property owners, as long as you do not interfere with their actions.
