

Immigrants Are Major Contributors to Colorado's Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities Industry



*An estimated **35,000** immigrants work in Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry, making up **17%** of Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities workforce.*

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry. Some 15,000 immigrants, or about 44% of all immigrants in Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry, are U.S. citizens. About 7,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 4,000 are temporary immigrants on a nonimmigrant visa.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 1,000 workers in Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry.

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) holders—immigrants who cannot safely return to their home countries—number 1,000 workers in Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry. Meanwhile, an estimated 5,000 immigrants working in Colorado's transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim.

Immigrant groups protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work permits, making up an estimated 4,000 transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry workers in Colorado.**
