

Immigrants Make FL-2 Stronger

*An estimated **67,000** immigrants live in FL-2, making up **9%** of the total population.*

*Immigrants live in **11%** of households in FL-2.*

Immigrants contribute to every sector of FL-2's economy. Some 11% of FL-2's labor force are immigrants, including 11% of the construction industry, 22% of agriculture, 8% of manufacturing, 14% of business services, and 15% of leisure and hospitality.

About **5,000** immigrants in FL-2 work in **STEM-related jobs**, of which 23% are temporary immigrants on H-1B and other temporary work visas. In all, 30% of STEM degree holders in FL-2 are immigrants.

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost FL-2's communities. Some 23,000 immigrants, or about 35% of all immigrants in FL-2, are U.S. citizens. About 10,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 6,000 are temporary immigrants (including nonimmigrant visa holders and international students).

An estimated **5%** of individuals in FL-2, or some **41,000**, are either **undocumented immigrants or live with an undocumented immigrant**. Some 5,000 U.S. citizen children in FL-2 live with an undocumented parent, while some 2,000 U.S. citizen spouses are married to an undocumented immigrant. Some 5,000 undocumented individuals in FL-2 have lived in the U.S. for more than 10 years, with 3,000 of those living in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 1,000 and **contribute \$34 million annually to FL-2's economy**. They also contribute \$4 million in state and local taxes each year.

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) holders—immigrants who cannot safely return to their home countries—numbered 5,000 and **contributed \$60 million to FL-2's economy** in 2024. Meanwhile, an estimated 15,000 immigrants in FL-2 are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim, and contribute \$304 million to FL-2's economy annually.

Immigrant groups currently protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work authorizations, making up an estimated 10,000 workers in FL-2's labor force, and paying an estimated \$46 million annually in state and local taxes.**
