

Immigrants Are Major Contributors to Georgia's Education Services

*An estimated **69,000** immigrants work in Georgia's education services, making up **11%** of Georgia's education services workforce.*

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost Georgia's education services. Some 38,000 immigrants, or about 56% of all immigrants in Georgia's education services, are U.S. citizens. About 14,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 8,000 are temporary immigrants on a nonimmigrant visa.

Annual combined income from immigrant education services workers

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 2,000 workers in Georgia's education services. Some 1,000 are Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients.

Annual combined taxes paid by immigrant education services workers

Immigrant groups protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work permits, making up an estimated 3,000 education services workers in Georgia.**
