

Immigrants Are Major Contributors to Georgia's Leisure and Hospitality Industry

*An estimated **95,000** immigrants work in Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry, making up **15%** of Georgia's leisure and hospitality workforce.*

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry. Some 31,000 immigrants, or about 33% of all immigrants in Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry, are U.S. citizens. About 12,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 7,000 are temporary immigrants on a nonimmigrant visa.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 9,000 workers in Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry.

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) holders—immigrants who cannot safely return to their home countries—number 5,000 workers in Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry. Meanwhile, an estimated 16,000 immigrants working in Georgia's leisure and hospitality industry are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim.

Immigrant groups protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work permits, making up an estimated 16,000 leisure and hospitality industry workers in Georgia.**
