

Immigrants Make MI-10 Stronger

*An estimated **118,000** immigrants live in MI-10, making up **15%** of the total population.*

*Immigrants live in **19%** of households in MI-10.*

Immigrants contribute to every sector of MI-10's economy. Some 17% of MI-10's labor force are immigrants, including 15% of the construction industry, 19% of agriculture, 20% of manufacturing, 16% of business services, and 18% of leisure and hospitality.

About 12,000 immigrants in MI-10 work in STEM-related jobs, of which 24% are temporary immigrants on H-1B and other temporary work visas. In all, 42% of STEM degree holders in MI-10 are immigrants.

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost MI-10's communities. Some 75,000 immigrants, or about 63% of all immigrants in MI-10, are U.S. citizens. About 22,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 10,000 are temporary immigrants (including nonimmigrant visa holders and international students).

An estimated 3% of individuals in MI-10, or some 25,000, are either undocumented immigrants or live with an undocumented immigrant. Some 3,000 U.S. citizen children in MI-10 live with an undocumented parent, while some 2,000 U.S. citizen spouses are married to an undocumented immigrant. Some 5,000 undocumented individuals in MI-10 have lived in the U.S. for more than 10 years, with 3,000 of those living in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 2,000 and **contribute \$62 million annually to MI-10's economy**. They also contribute \$7 million in state and local taxes each year.

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) holders—immigrants who cannot safely return to their home countries—numbered 1,000 and **contributed \$20 million to MI-10's economy** in 2024. Meanwhile, an estimated 4,000 immigrants in MI-10 are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim, and contribute \$124 million to MI-10's economy annually.

Immigrant groups currently protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work authorizations, making up an estimated 3,000 workers in MI-10's labor force, and paying an estimated \$18 million annually in state and local taxes.**
