

Immigrants Make NY-3 Stronger

*An estimated **240,000** immigrants live in NY-3, making up **31%** of the total population.*

*Immigrants live in **44%** of households in NY-3.*

Immigrants contribute to every sector of NY-3's economy. Some 38% of NY-3's labor force are immigrants, including 41% of the construction industry, 57% of agriculture, 46% of manufacturing, 35% of business services, and 34% of leisure and hospitality.

About 13,000 immigrants in NY-3 work in STEM-related jobs, of which 11% are temporary immigrants on H-1B and other temporary work visas. In all, 45% of STEM degree holders in NY-3 are immigrants.

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost NY-3's communities. Some 147,000 immigrants, or about 62% of all immigrants in NY-3, are U.S. citizens. About 47,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 6,000 are temporary immigrants (including nonimmigrant visa holders and international students).

An estimated 12% of individuals in NY-3, or some 92,000, are either undocumented immigrants or live with an undocumented immigrant. Some 15,000 U.S. citizen children in NY-3 live with an undocumented parent, while some 4,000 U.S. citizen spouses are married to an undocumented immigrant. Some 21,000 undocumented individuals in NY-3 have lived in the U.S. for more than 10 years, with 9,000 of those living in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 7,000 and **contribute \$171 million annually to NY-3's economy**. They also contribute \$28 million in state and local taxes each year. Some 1,000 are Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients.

Temporary Protected Status (TPS) holders—immigrants who cannot safely return to their home countries—numbered 6,000 and **contributed \$168 million to NY-3's economy** in 2024. Meanwhile, an estimated 7,000 immigrants in NY-3 are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim, and contribute \$137 million to NY-3's economy annually.

Immigrant groups currently protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work authorizations, making up an estimated 9,000 workers in NY-3's labor force, and paying an estimated \$54 million annually in state and local taxes.**
