

Immigrants Make OR-4 Stronger

*An estimated **36,000** immigrants live in OR-4, making up **5%** of the total population.*

*Immigrants live in **8%** of households in OR-4.*

Immigrants contribute to every sector of OR-4's economy. Some 7% of OR-4's labor force are immigrants, including 7% of the construction industry, 12% of agriculture, 7% of manufacturing, 5% of business services, and 8% of leisure and hospitality.

About 2,000 immigrants in OR-4 work in STEM-related jobs, of which 16% are temporary immigrants on H-1B and other temporary work visas. In all, 13% of STEM degree holders in OR-4 are immigrants.

Immigrants of all backgrounds boost OR-4's communities. Some 14,000 immigrants, or about 39% of all immigrants in OR-4, are U.S. citizens. About 10,000 are lawful permanent residents, and 4,000 are temporary immigrants (including nonimmigrant visa holders and international students).

Some 17,000 are either undocumented immigrants or live with an undocumented immigrant. Some 3,000 U.S. citizen children in OR-4 live with an undocumented parent, while some 2,000 U.S. citizen spouses are married to an undocumented immigrant. Some 4,000 undocumented individuals in OR-4 have lived in the U.S. for more than 10 years, with 3,000 of those living in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

Dreamers—undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children before 2021 and are either in school or have graduated from high school—number 2,000 and **contribute \$51 million annually to OR-4's economy.** They also contribute \$7 million in state and local taxes each year. Some 1,000 are Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients.

An estimated 4,000 immigrants in OR-4 are waiting for a decision on their asylum claim, and contribute \$44 million to OR-4's economy annually.

Immigrant groups currently protected from deportation—DACA recipients, TPS holders, people seeking asylum, and those waiting for a permanent residency visa—**have access to work authorizations, making up an estimated 3,000 workers in OR-4's labor force, and paying an estimated \$9 million annually in state and local taxes.**
